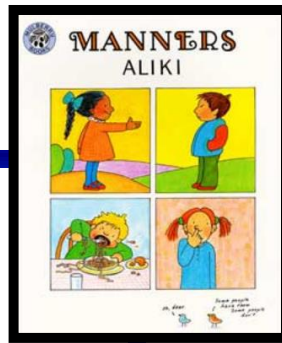

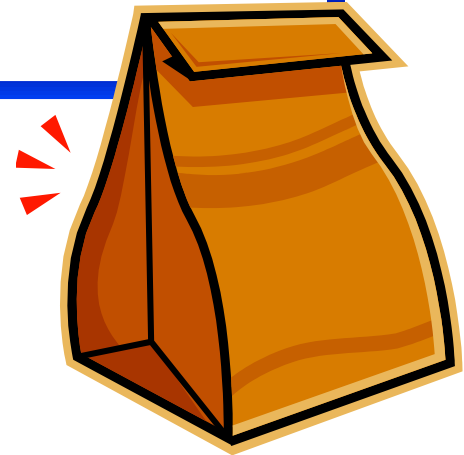


Objectives:

- Use end punctuation.

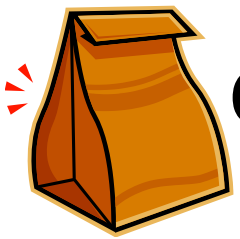
Assignment Description
